## **FIRST TROOP MEETING – SEPTEMBER 10, 2015**

The first Troop Meeting for the year was held at the Elks Lodge Carriage House on North Park Street on September 10, 2015 at 7:00 p.m. Please be on time to participate in all the meetings.

**Parents are asked to attend the October 15th meeting for a discussion of the year's program.**

**TROOP MEETINGS** are held at the Elks Lodge Carriage House. The meetings will begin **promptly at 7:00 p.m. and end at 8:30pm.** Troop meetings will be held on Thursday evenings. Meetings are not scheduled on school holidays or during school vacations. The attached Program Schedule lists all the Troop Activities and Meeting dates. The Troop Leadership understands that the Scouts have many demands for their time. We try to make our schedule accommodate those with other activities. We ask that if there is a conflict to please try to attend part of the meeting so that you can at least get the announcements.

**INCLEMENT WEATHER - When Vernon schools are cancelled due to snow or ice (or any other reason schools are closed) there will be no Scout Meeting.**

**PATROL MEETING** dates and times will be set by the Patrol. The Patrol Leader is responsible for informing the Junior Assistant Scout Master (JASM) as to the time and place of each Patrol Meeting. The JASM will ensure that a senior is present at each Patrol Meeting. Our JASM for this year has yet to be selected.

**TROOP COMMITTEE MEETINGS** are normally held once a month on the fourth Tuesday at 7:30 p.m. The Program Schedule lists the dates for these meetings, please be sure to double check on the troops' website calendar. Attendees are normally limited to the Adult Troop Leaders, JASM, the Senior and Assistant Senior Patrol Leaders, and Troop Committee Members. ## **.UNIFORM REQUIREMENTS**

All Scouts must be in Class A uniform for scheduled meetings and activities (unless announced otherwise for specific events). Troop 20/20 uniform requirements are:

- Scout Shirt with appropriate insignia (short sleeve is recommended and required for summer camp)
- Scout Neckerchief (Troop 20/20)
- Neckerchief Slide
- Scout Belt
- Scout Cap (Troop 20/20 Blue Hat w/ New Logo)
- Scout Pants or Blue Jeans
- Scout Shorts & Scout Socks (required for summer camp)

Questions concerning these items (and/or where to obtain them) can be answered by any of the Scouts or Adult Leaders.

The first troop meeting of each month, Class B uniform is optional. The 20/20 Class B uniform consists of: Troop 20/20 Hat, Troop 20/20 T-shirt or polo shirt, Scout pants/shorts or blue jeans.

The third troop meeting of the month is designated as “Polar Bear” Neckerchief which substitutes the Troop 20/20 Neckerchief with the Polar Bear neckerchiefs earned at summer camp

### **20/20 - OPTIONAL LOGO EMBOSSED CLOTHING**

Scouts may purchase Troop 20/20 T-shirts - \$20.00, Golf Shirts \$25.00, Fleece - \$25.00, Troop Neckerchief - \$10.00 and Troop 20/20 Hats - \$12.00. Older 20/20 clothing is available at a discount. These items may be purchased on any meeting night from the Troop Store ( Please see Chairman Steve) .

## **UNIT ORGANIZATION**

This year your Troop will have one senior patrol and four additional patrols. A Troop Roster will be distributed listing all members. A Leadership Corps will be formed and will be responsible for planning all Troop meetings and activities.

## **DUES FOR THE 2015-2016 SCOUTING SEASON**

Annual dues for each scout are \$25.00. **This amount must be paid by Thursday, October 15, 2015.**

Of the \$25.00 annual Troop Fee, \$24.00 is for annual national dues. The National Scouting Organization uses these funds to provide direction and support to our Council and District to maintain a well-rounded Scouting Program. Another \$3.00 per person of this amount provides each Scout with Boy Scout of America Accident Insurance, underwritten by Health Special Risk, Inc. and \$19.00 to support the Connecticut Rivers Council. Our dues have maintained the same rate through the Friendly's Fundraisers.

Along with the October dues payment you will have the option to start or renew your subscription to BOYS' LIFE, the official Scouting magazine. A one-year subscription costs \$12.00 and delivery will start in February or March 2016.

**All Checks made payable to Troop 20/20, BSA.** Your cooperation in providing payment to our Treasurer, Mr. Mike Pezzetti, via your Chairman, within the requested periods will be appreciated.

- Foster a cooperative interaction between Troops in the area
- Encourage active participation for Order of the Arrow (OA) members in OA functions

## TROOP PROGRAM SCHEDULE

Attached is a Program Schedule that lists all meetings and activities for the 2015-2016 programs. **PLEASE REVIEW IT AND MARK ALL IMPORTANT DATES ON YOUR CALENDAR.** Notices/Permission Slips will be made available on our Website for each camping trip and away activity. Signed parental permission slips and any fees must be turned in by the specified date on the schedule or the date stated on the form.

## PERMISSION SLIPS

In order for the leadership to perform the necessary planning and organizing for a Troop Camping Trip, it is essential that permission slips be turned in on the specified date. It is the Scout's sole responsibility to ensure that his permission slip is turned in on time. Failure to meet this requirement results in the Scout losing his privilege to participate in the trip. **In Scouting it is important that the boys learn that they will be held accountable for their actions.** To provide reasonable opportunity for all Scouts to meet the Permission Slip requirements the Troop has adopted the following procedures:

- Permission Slips will be available before at the designated Troop Meeting (see Program Schedule) at least two weeks prior to the campout, by e-mail if you have provided us with an e-mail address or can be found posted on our webpage **www.T2020.org**
- If the Scout does not return a Permission Slip prior to the designated return date, then he may contact Katrina Tierney at 860-872-0494 or Steve Michaud at 860-944-5715.
- Permission Slips will be collected at the designated Troop Meeting (see Program Schedule) one week prior to the campout. When each Permission Slip is returned the Scout must make a cash food deposit (usually \$15.00) for the trip. It is very important that the food deposit is in cash, the money will be given to the Scouts designated to buy groceries for their patrols that evening. The final food assessment per Scout will be based upon actual food costs. Adult food cost is \$15.00(ish).

- If a Scout cannot attend the Troop Meeting where Permission Slips are collected and he does not have a friend bring it for him, he must take the following actions:
  1. Call Mr. Magnotta at 872-1274 or an Assistant Scout Master preferably before the Troop Meeting, but no later than Sunday evening following the meeting and advise the leader that he will participate in the trip.
  2. On or before the Sunday following the meeting: mail or deliver the completed Permission Slip and his **\$15.00 cash** food deposit to:

- If a scout is unable to attend a campout that he has signed up for refunds will be made if food and other campout expenses have not been incurred. Refunds will only be applied to the scouts account. Please be aware that a portion of the money for campouts is used to purchase common food (i.e. Hot Dogs, Mountain Pies, etc.), if the food has already been purchased for the campout only a partial refund may be made to the scouts account. Please see the online shopping guide on our website for advice on purchasing food for patrol campouts.



## **ADVANCEMENT**

### **GENERAL RULES**

- Standards for advancement are listed in the latest edition of the Official Boy Scout Handbook and the Boy Scouts Requirement Book.
  
- Leadership requirements for advancement shall be subject to approval by the Troop Leadership and based on the performance of duties.
  
- Service time for advanced ranks must be an approved Troop Activity or Service Project.
  
- When a Scout believes he has completed all the requirements for a rank advancement he must contact the Troop Advancement Chairman, Steve Houghtaling, and review his advancement record.
  
- If the Advancement Chairman certifies that the requirements have been met, he will schedule a Board of review for the Scout.
  
- The Board of Review has three purposes: (1) To confirm that the Scout has learned the required information and mastered the required skills; (2) To check to see what kind of experience the Scout is having in his Patrol and in the Troop; and (3) To encourage the Scout to advance to his next rank.

- The Board of Review is not a complete reexamination of all requirements. The Board will ask questions to ensure that the Scout has met the requirements, to determine the Scout's attitude, and to confirm his Scouting Spirit. He will be asked where he learned his skills, who taught him, and what he gained from his experience.

After the review is completed, the candidate is asked to leave while the Board discusses his qualifications. After a decision is made, the candidate is brought before the Board and informed of the Board's decision.

Working with the Troop's Adult Leaders, the Committee has contributed to the development of the Scouting Program for the 2015-2016 year. The Committee will do all it can to support the Unit's Leaders and will seek parents' help in specific instances (transportation to/from activities, making a presentation to the Troop etc.). We encourage all parents to consider joining the Committee; we could always use your help.

## **FOOD ALLERGY PROTOCOL**

Discussion around being prepared for our scouts with food allergies in order to make sure all of our scouts are included in meals /cooking activities with their patrol.

Food shoppers need to be made aware of special requirements for our scouts with food allergies. If they can't find appropriate items, communication must be made with leaders/parents so they can provide their own food if needed.

Boys will still be asked to follow the general meal plan. Ex: If having 'cold breakfast', they should plan an appropriate cold breakfast.

Troop leaders will provide an additional stove for cooking, when food needs to be cooked separately. This will also allow for more cooking opportunities for our scouts.

During cleanup, dishes used to prepare meals for our scouts with food allergies should be washed first and not be in contact with other dishes.

## **REQUIREMENTS FOR HIGH ADVENTURE CAMP**

13 years of age and finished 8th grade

Rank of Star

Blue Swimmer

The Senior Scouts work very hard to assist in the fundraising for high adventure camp. Cost includes camp fees, airfare, food and vehicle rentals (if needed). Other costs may incur depending on the trip. Meetings and notices are sent out to keep parents up to date. Any questions regarding High Adventure may be brought to Bill Magnotta.

## **SIGN OFF ON REQUIREMENTS**

### **Tenderfoot, Second Class, First Class**

Patrol Leaders and members of the Leadership Corps may test and sign off a Scout on requirements for these ranks as long as the approving Scout has that authority. Scouts may not sign off for their brothers. Also, the Junior Assistant Scoutmaster and all adult committee members may sign off requirements. Adults may not sign off for their sons.

## **MERIT BADGE PROCEDURES**

**STEP 1:** The Scout must first request an application for a merit badge (N04124-Blue Card), and have it signed by the Scoutmaster or designee. This must be done before the Scout contacts a Merit Badge Counselor. The Advancement Chairman has a complete listing of Approved Merit Badge Counselors.

**STEP 2:** The Scout must contact an approved Merit Badge Counselor and arrange to work with the Counselor on the badge. This must be done prior to beginning any work on the badge. The Counselor will review the requirements and explain what must be done. **When a Scout meets with a Counselor, another Scout or an adult must be with him.**

**STEP 3:** Complete the requirements specified by the Counselor and be tested by the Counselor. Have the Counselor sign the three designated areas on the blue card and return it to the Advancement Chairman.

## **TROOP 20/20 HISTORY**

Troop 20/20 was chartered in June 1980 and began with seven Webelos "graduates" from Pack 382 in Vernon. Since then, the Unit's membership has grown to its present level of 42 registered Scouts. The Troop's first sponsor was the Lion's Club of Rockville/Vernon.

Our distinctive unit number, "20/20", is directly related to the Lions' service to the community in recycling old eyeglasses to the needy. The next sponsor of the Troop was the Skinner Road PTO. Then the sponsor was the Rockville Moose Lodge for many years until 2010 when they closed. Currently our sponsor is the Rockville Elks Lodge #1359.

Your Troop began its existence with no equipment, other than five old, leaky tents donated by Troop 96 of Ellington. Aided by several generous, timely and much needed contributions from the Lion's Club, Aetna Life and Casualty, Vernon Health Care Facility, The E.W. Burke Trust, the Moose Lodge, Skinner Road PTO and the Rockville Elks Lodge #1359, the Units membership has worked hard to raise funds necessary to acquire sufficient camping equipment to provide a sound Scouting Program. Fundraising activities by the Scouts have included the assembly and sale of first aid kits, telephone directory deliveries, sale of light bulbs, Jeannie kits, candy sales and Dunkin Donut Certificate sales. As the newer Scouts enter the Unit, it is now equipped for them through the hard work of Scouts from previous years. It is now their responsibility to continue to help raise funds to sustain the Troop.

Troop 20/20 is proud of its service to the community. The Unit has devoted many hours of personal growth enriching service to Vernon Health Care Facility. They visited with elderly residents, shined the resident's shoes and planted/tended the flower gardens for the resident's enjoyment. Other examples of service projects include the new Site 8 pavilion and bulletin board, grounds work at J.N. Webster Scout Reservation, road side rubbish cleanup, leaf raking, Skinner Road School cleanup, Taste of Vernon cleanup, Moose Lodge dinners, Christmas in April, Spring and Fall Cleanup



of the Rockville Elks Lodge and other projects for various scout camps.

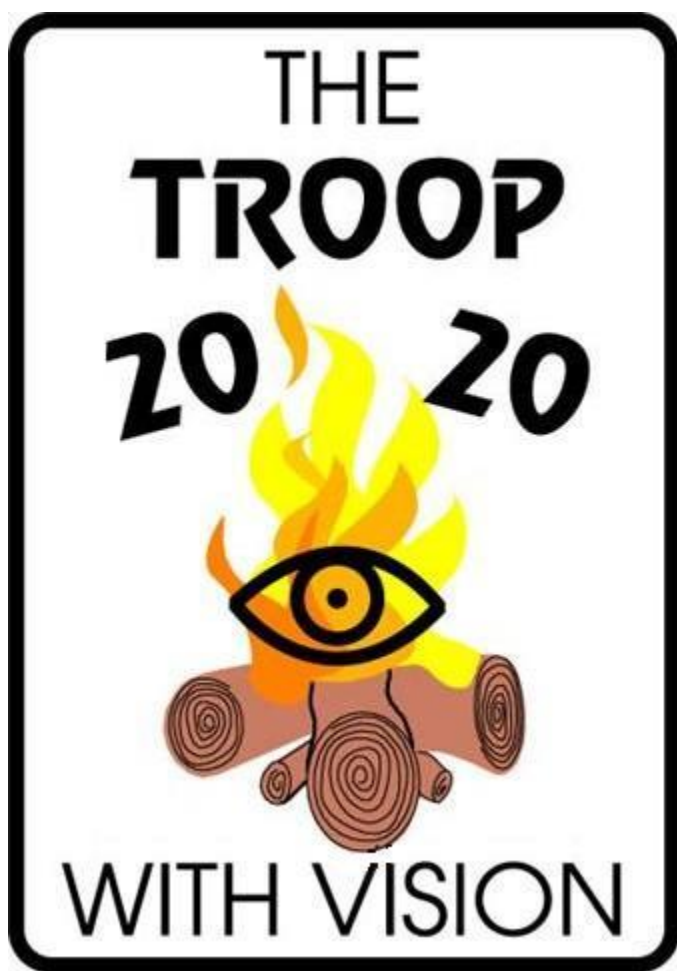
